The RCSI mini-med course ran over three days and was live to over three thousands students. across the country. The Royal College of Surgeons ran this online course to give students a taste of what studying medicine would be like and show students all the different careers and areas you can go into if you go for a medical degree. During the three days we talked to different professors, doctors, patients and students who talked about either their job, area, experiences or in the students case about their life in RSCI and what they think of the college. A big part of the course was watching multiple live surgeries which was, by far, the highlight of doing this course. We got to watch a keyhole oesophagus surgery, a caesarean section, a tonsillectomy and a gallbladder removal.


Ailbhe Quinlan and Brooke Dwyer competed in the quarter finals of the Leinster schools UCD debating competition. The motion they argued was:


This House, as Taoiseach, Would Fly to Washington DC for St. Patrick's Day During Lockdown
