

From the STEM Committee



From the Environment Committee



This year the environment committee is working hard and has held a number of meetings with great participation and enthusiasm shown by its members. Transition Year

Transition Year's have had a busy year so far. In September they started the year with a day trip to Causey Farm. They did a variety of activities including baking brown bread, ceili dancing, a bog walk and feeding farm animals.

During Spirit Week TY's had an activity day where they played team games and did an orienteering treasure hunt around Blackrock.





Think Languages in November was another great day for TY's – it was a day to celebrate different cultures and learn new languages. We welcomed Rikako and her team to teach our students about Japanese culture. Students learned a traditional Japanese dance and had the chance to try on traditional Japanese clothing including Yukata and Kimono.

Workshops that the Transition Years enjoyed have enjoyed so far this year include making bodhrans with "Handcrafted

Bodhrans", investigating the JFK assassination with "Forensic Fun" and hair styling with "Rootine Hair".

Guest speakers have included Olivia Carpenter from Breast Cancer Ireland and Dr Niamh Shaw who spoke about space exploration. Another speaker was author Stephen Kiernan who spoke about his book Brilliant Mondays, How Ordinary People

Brilliant Mondays, How Ordinary People Achieve Extraordinary Things.

Nearly all students have been working to complete the Bronze Gaisce Award. Students must complete 13 weeks of community work, personal skill and physical recreation. They must also hike 25km over 2 days.

In September students received their Junior Cert Profile of Achievement Certificates. It was great to celebrate all the hard work they put into the studies from 1st to 3rd Year. Students were treated to a 99 from Teddy's ice cream.






Some other projects that Transition Years have participated in include writing and recording a radio show for Blackrock College Radio. They have been helping primary school children in a Reading Buddy programme with Kinia. The Fashion module spear headed a Christmas Clearout campaign. It was organised to promote and encourage sustainable clothing and was all in aid of a good cause - the St Vincent de Paul. The Religion classes worked together to collect winter accessories and non perishable goods

which were donated to Cross Care in Dun Laoghaire. They also hosted a small coffee morning and raised €100.

Every Tuesday afternoon all Transition Years are timetabled for a variety of activities. So far this year they have completed a scavenger hunt, photography competition, and a games afternoon. They relaxed for an afternoon of mindful colouring and even ventured to Dun Laoghaire to walk the east pier. Students did 2 online course – one to prepare for work experience called *Get Safe – Work Safe: Health and Safety in the Workplace for Students Starting Work.* They also completed the Concussion Coach education course.


Our Senior B team is in Leinster League, division 3, this year. They have started off the season extremely well with a tight match against Mount Sackville and with a very impressive win against the High School.
